



**NEH Landmarks of American History and Culture: Workshops for Schoolteachers at Wilson's Creek National Battlefield and Drury University, Springfield, Missouri  
June 14-18, 2010 or June 21-25, 2010**

Drury University and Wilson's Creek National Battlefield invite you to join us for an extraordinary chance to relive one of the most overlooked– and yet important– battles in the Civil War. *Wilson's Creek: How a Forgotten Battle Saved Missouri and Changed the Course of the Civil War* will bring together K-12 educators with leading humanities scholars for unique enrichment exercises centering around this significant battle. We will explore the cornfields, farmhouses, and knolls where Union and Confederate soldiers fought and died during the first summer of the Civil War; examine a veritable treasure trove of new course content, including original letters, journals, and drawings by soldiers who fought in the battle; learn about poetic accounts of Wilson's Creek by authors such as Herman Melville and engravings and lithographs by Currier & Ives and others. Many of these items are conveniently located at the Wilson's Creek National Battlefield, widely regarded as the most pristine battlefield in the National Park Service system.

**Who is eligible to participate?** K-12 educators (including librarians, substitute teachers, administrators, and paraprofessionals in public, private, parochial, and charter schools as well as parents home-schooling their children are eligible to participate.

**Stipend and Travel Costs:** Participants will receive a stipend of \$1,200 following the residential workshop session. Stipends are intended to help cover ordinary living expenses, books, and travel.

**Professional Development or College Credits:** All participants will receive certificates that may be used to request Continuing Education Credits (CEUs) or Professional Development Points (PDPs) from home school districts. Workshop participants seeking graduate credit may enroll for three hours of credit from Drury University.
